## Keynote Talk Title: Working with dementia

This presentation presents dementia as a workplace issue, particularly in the context of the UK's ageing workforce. As more people remain in employment later in life, the likelihood of developing dementia while still working increases.

The presentation will highlight the complex challenges faced by employees with dementia, including stigma, lack of understanding, and limited workplace support. Case studies will illustrate the contrasting experiences of individuals post-diagnosis, highlighting the potential for continued employment post-diagnosis of dementia.

The presentation will also report on employers responses to dementia in the workplace, highlighting gaps in awareness, legal understanding, and preparedness to support affected employees. Despite existing legislation like the Equality Act 2010 and international frameworks such as the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, many employers struggle to implement inclusive practices or reasonable adjustments.

The presentation concludes by exploring how we can create a positive shift to recognise the value and potential of employees with dementia and emphasising the importance of purpose, identity, and meaningful engagement in work. Creating inclusive, flexible, and supportive workplaces is essential for individual wellbeing and also for broader social and economic benefit.

#### Talk Title:

The Courage to Retain: Why Employers Win with Dementia Inclusivity.

Peter Middleton is a passionate advocate, blogger, and volunteer living with young-onset dementia. Diagnosed in 2018 at the age of 64, he has turned his journey into a mission to raise awareness, support research, and challenge misconceptions about dementia.

Before his diagnosis, Peter worked as a Police Community Support Officer in Northamptonshire for 12 years, following a career in IT consultancy and as an Aircraft Engineer in the RAF. This background, combined with lived experience, gives him a unique perspective he shares through his blog Living with Dementia, where he writes about daily life, advice, and broader social issues.

Peter is active in national dementia initiatives, including the Alzheimer's Society, Young Dementia Network, and Dementia Voice, helping shape projects and services. In 2023, his dedication was honoured when he was named a Coronation Volunteer Champion by the Royal Voluntary Service.

Locally, Peter volunteers at the Burton Latimer Heritage Centre, facilitates a dementia support group, and runs comedy workshops. He also contributes to research through Join Dementia Research, taking part in studies that aim to improve diagnosis and understanding.

Through his writing, volunteering, and public speaking, Peter continues to demonstrate resilience, inspire others, and make a meaningful impact in the dementia community.

#### Talk title:

The impact of a dementia diagnosis while still working: A carers perspective

Chris and Alison's presentation will explore the often-overlooked challenges faced when a dementia diagnosis intersects with working life. Drawing on Chris's personal experience as a carer, they will highlight the emotional and practical realities of supporting a loved one while balancing employment, the strain this places on family life, and the financial consequences that can follow.

Alison will bring her personal and professional expertise to frame these personal experiences within the wider context of research and policy, offering insight into how workplaces and systems can better support carers.

Talk Title:

Dementia in the Workplace Research

Following a 35-year career in the banking sector, most recently as a Senior Colleague Experience Manager specialising in vulnerability, Claire pursued a new direction into academic research, driven by her interest in dementia, specifically exploring the challenges faced by working age carers.

Claire's research project (funded by public health in North Northamptonshire Council as part of the Orchard Project) forms part of a unique community-based partnership project between a regional UK (North Northants) County Council and the University of Northampton's (UK) Dementia Research and Innovation Centre. The study aims to explore the impact of a dementia diagnosis upon couples by examining the experience of people transitioning into an unpaid carer role for their partner.

By raising awareness and reducing stigma related to dementia, the insight from this study will inform future services, support and education for unpaid dementia carers and towards the maintenance of positive health and wellbeing.

At todays Dementia in the Workplace conference, Claire will be sharing her findings from a recent dementia in the workplace survey conducted with local organisations and the pre-conference survey results.
